

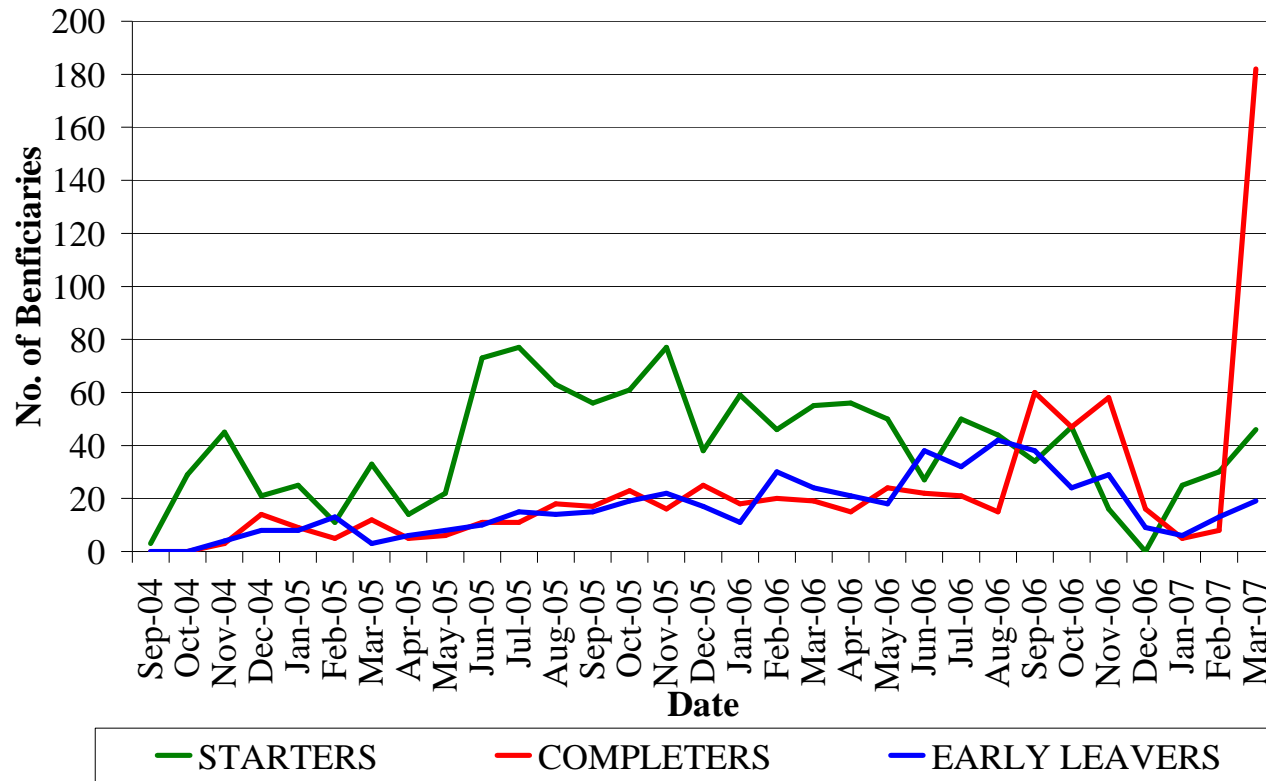

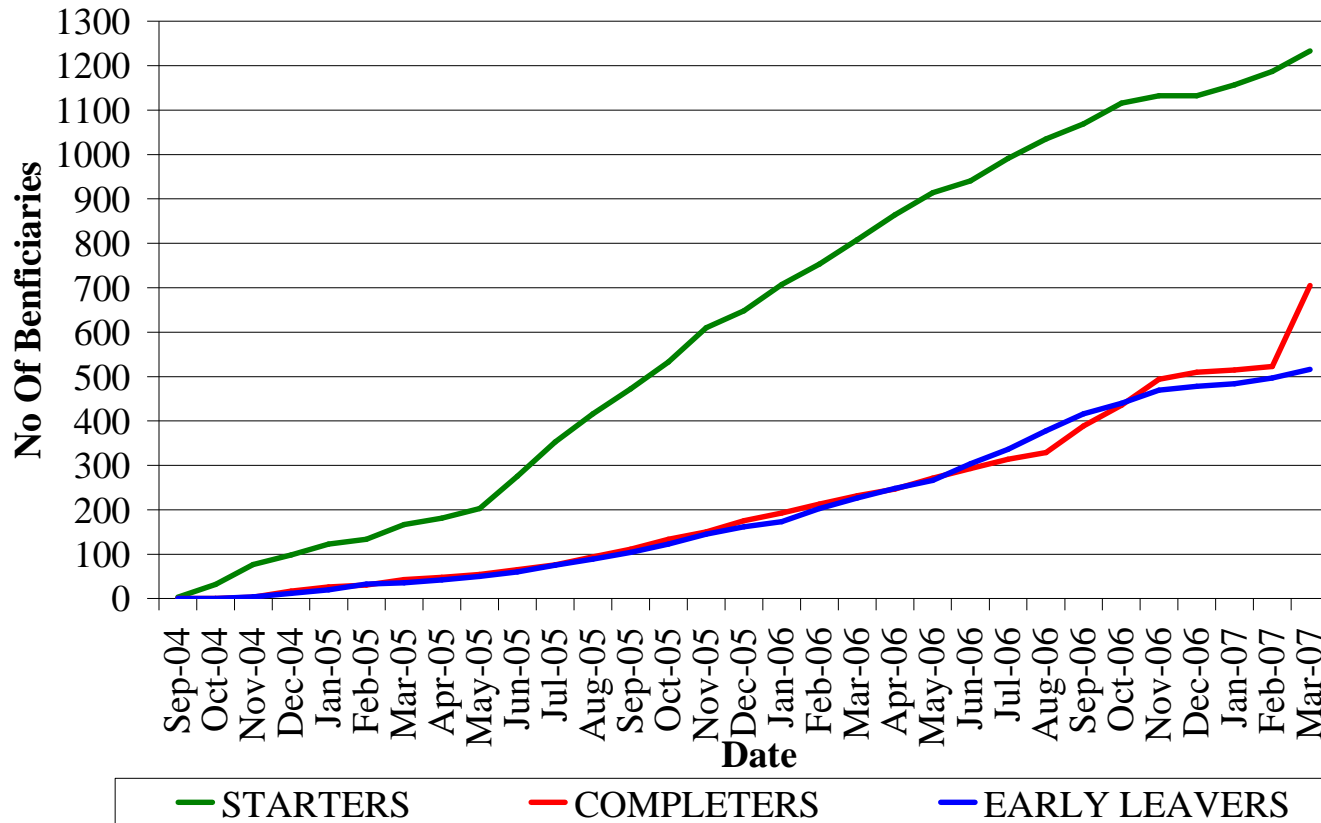

Starters, Completers and Early Leavers Per Month



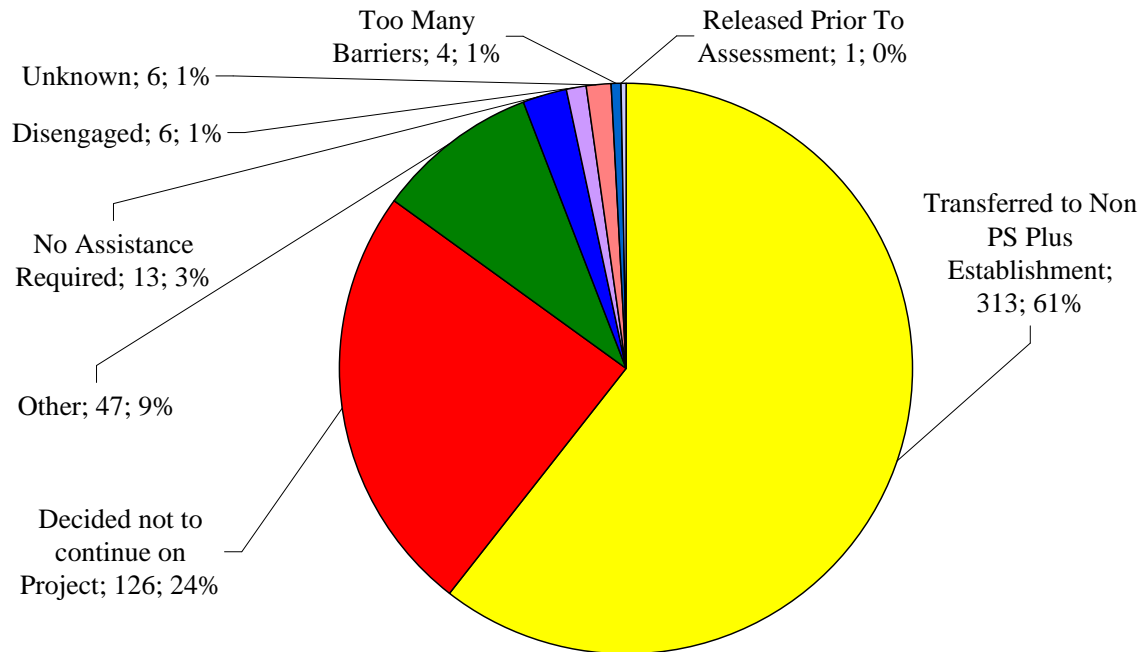
- Most months, Highpoint started between 30 and 80 beneficiaries on the PS Plus 2 project.
- Up until the last 7 months of the project (project closure), no more than 30 beneficiaries were completing the PS Plus 2 project per month.

Cumulative Starters, Completers and Early Leavers



- Over 1200 beneficiaries were started on PS Plus 2 in Highpoint.
- Approximately 1220 beneficiaries finished in Highpoint – 705 completed the project and 516 left the project early.

Reasons for Early Leavers

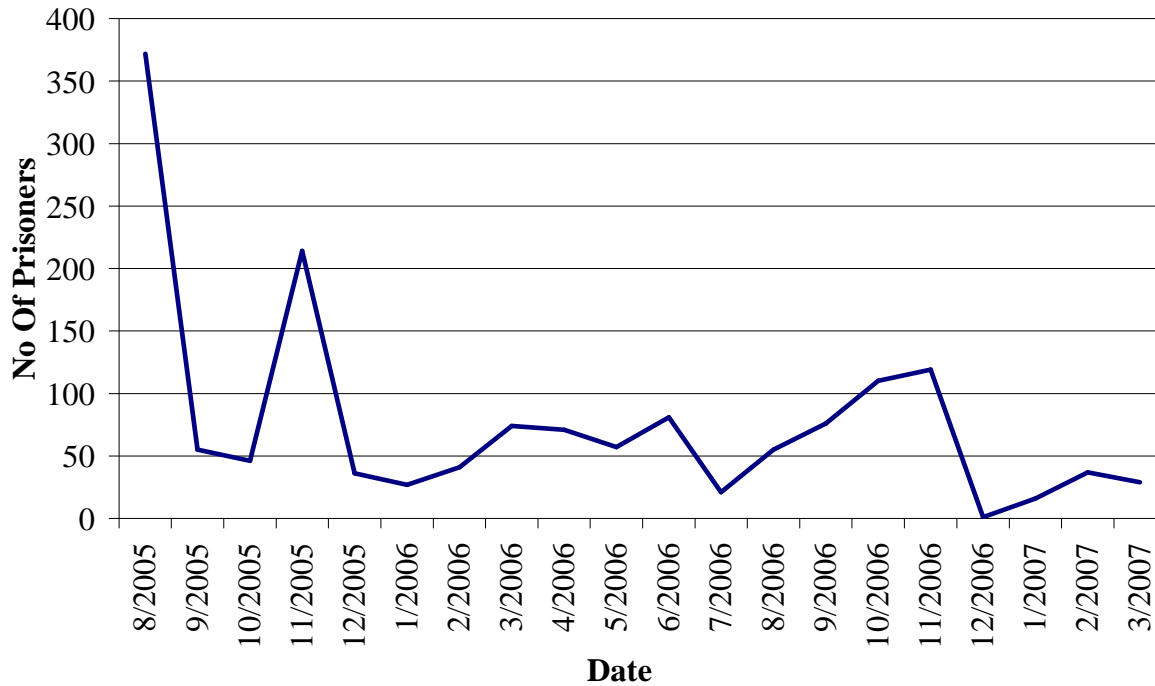

- Of the 516 beneficiaries who left the project early, 61% (313) transferred to a non-PS Plus establishment.
- 126 of early leavers decided not to continue on the project.

Non-Starters Per Month



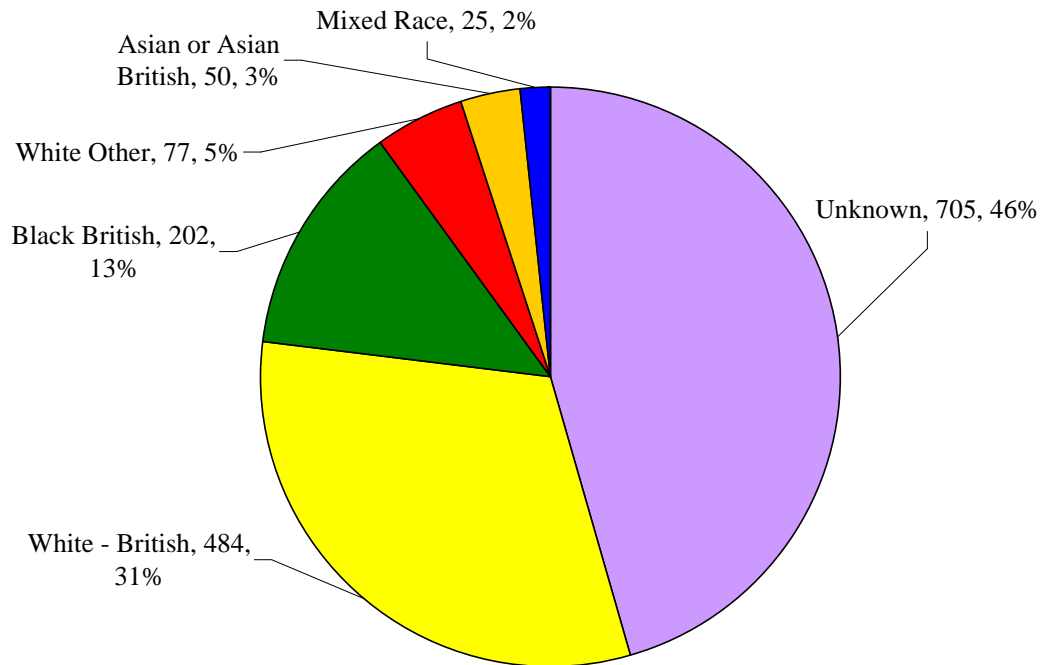

- Most months, over 50 prisoners were seen and deemed unsuitable for the project.
- In total, over 1500 prisoners were not started on the PS Plus 2 project in Highpoint.
- 478 of the prisoners not started in Highpoint did not require PS Plus Services and 572 prisoners transferred before being started on the project (25 transferred before the assessment entered and 547 to a non-PS Plus establishment).

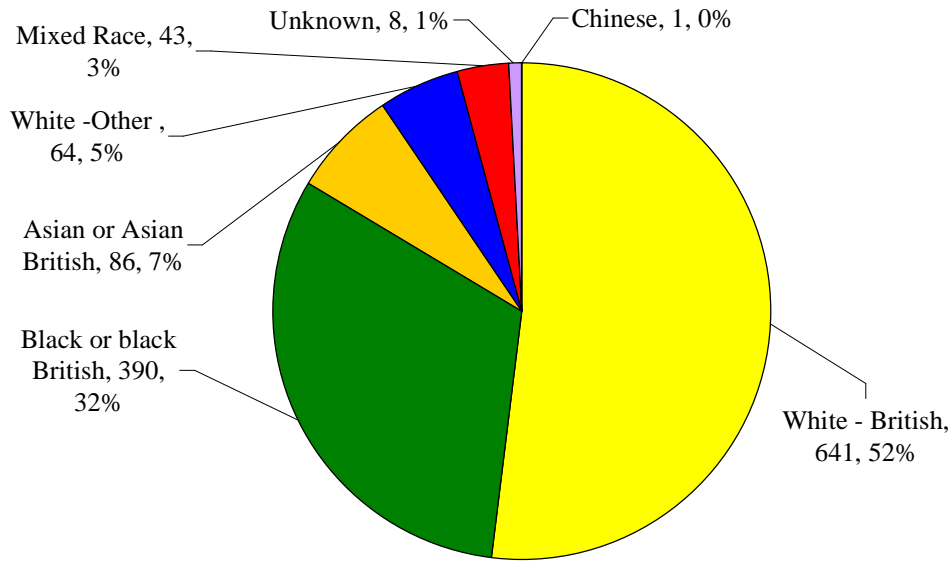

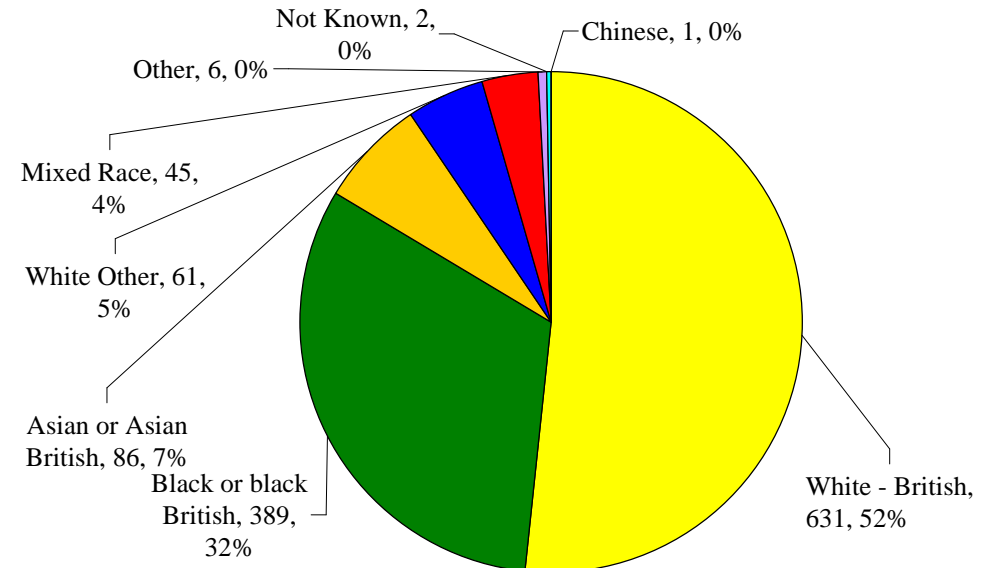
- o The majority of the prisoners not started on the PS Plus project (where the ethnic origin was known) were White-British (31%) and were from United Kingdom (51%).
- o The ethnic origin for 46% and the nationality of 38% of the prisoners not started was unknown.
- o Ethnic minorities account for 23% (354 prisoners) of the prisoners not started.

- 52% (641) of the beneficiaries who started and 52% (631) of the beneficiaries who finished in Highpoint were White-British.
- 47% (584) of the beneficiaries who started and 48% (582) of the beneficiaries who finished in Highpoint were from ethnic minorities.
- The Ethnic Origin of 8 beneficiaries who started and 2 beneficiaries who finished in Highpoint is unknown.

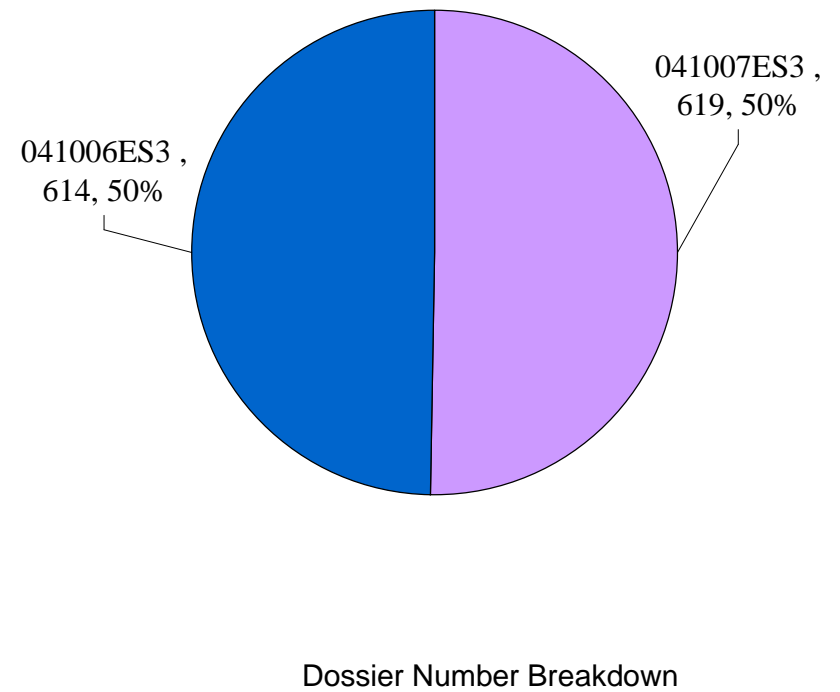
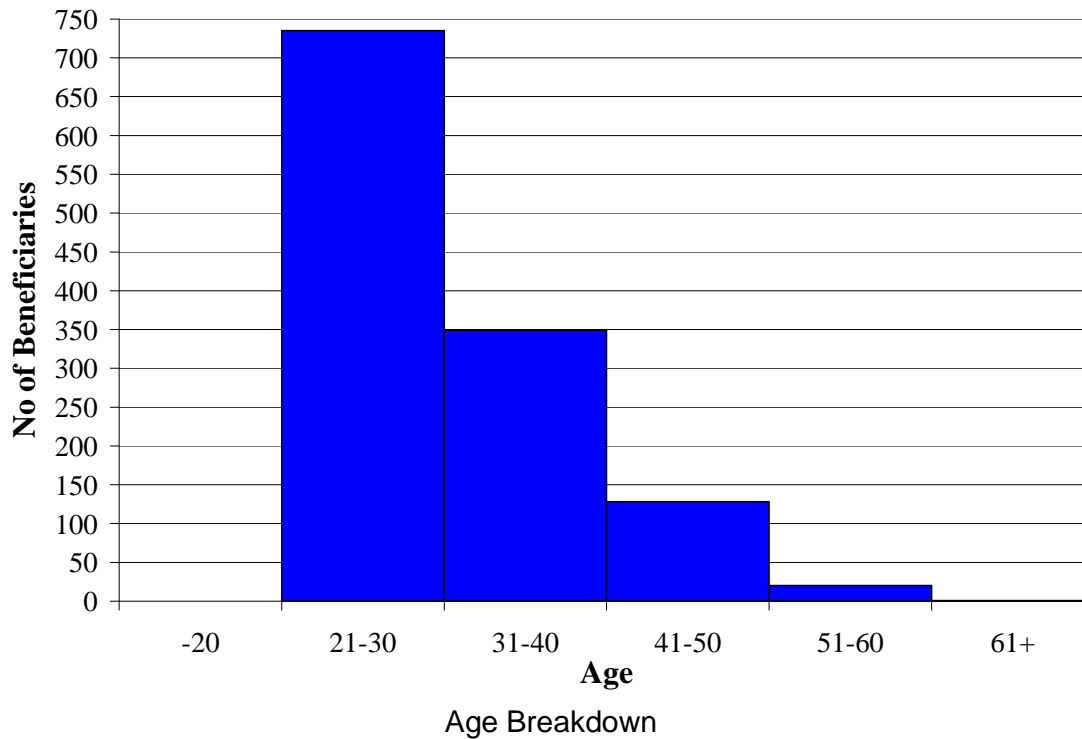

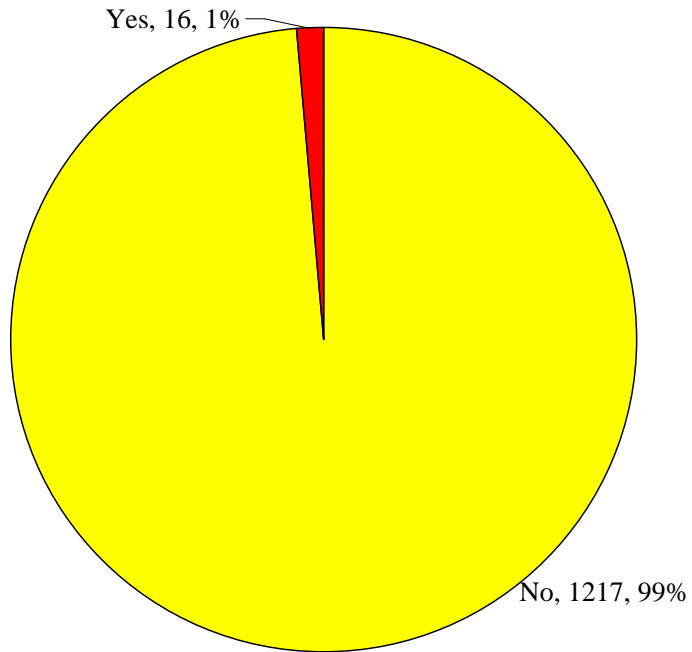
- 78% (963) of the beneficiaries started in Highpoint stated that their nationality is United Kingdom or British.
- 78% (947) of the beneficiaries who finished in Highpoint stated that their nationality is United Kingdom or British.
- The nationalities of 160 of the beneficiaries who started in Highpoint and 165 of the beneficiaries who finished in Highpoint are unknown.

Age and Dossier Number of Beneficiaries on Starting PS Plus 2

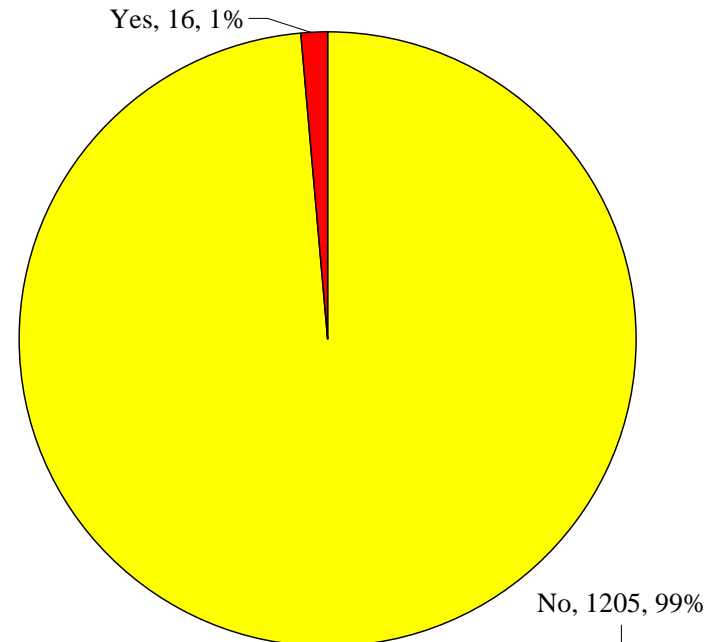


- The average (mean) age of the beneficiaries started in Highpoint is 30 years and 4 months. The average (mode) age group is 21 – 30 years old.
- Just over 50% (619) of the beneficiaries are in the ESF Group 041007ES3 male beneficiaries aged 28 and over).

Disabled Beneficiaries



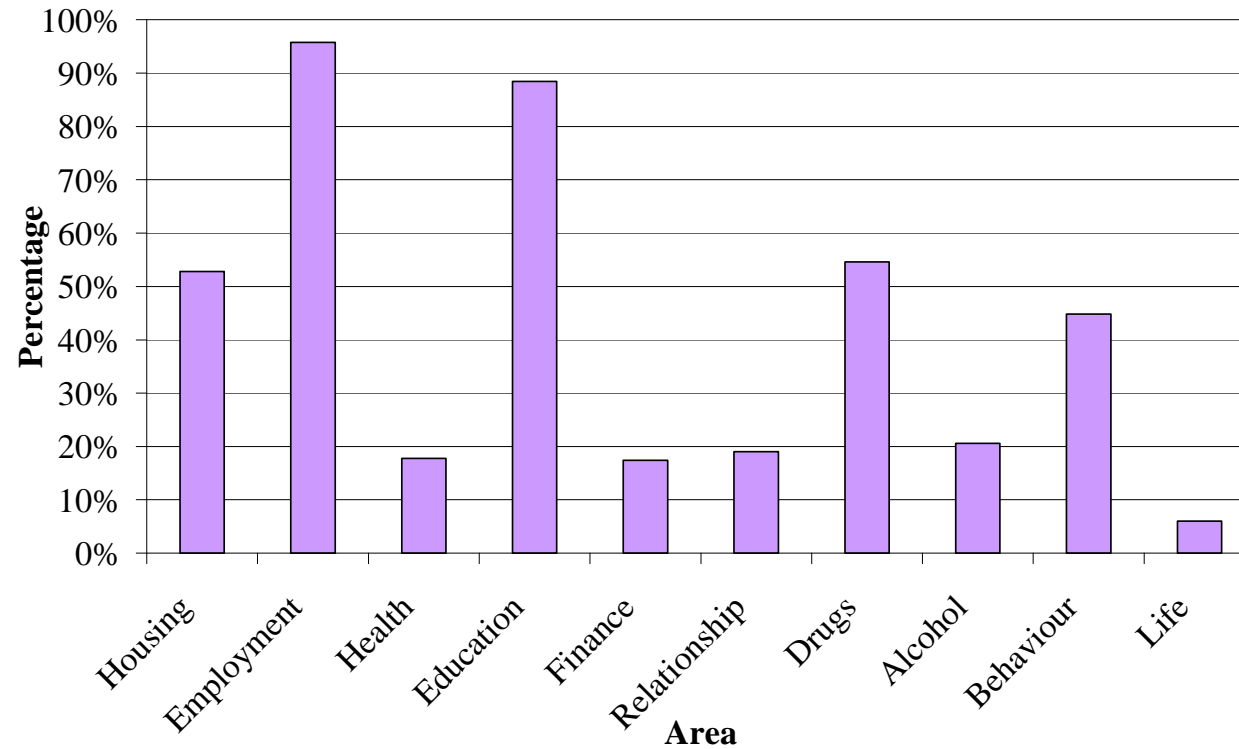

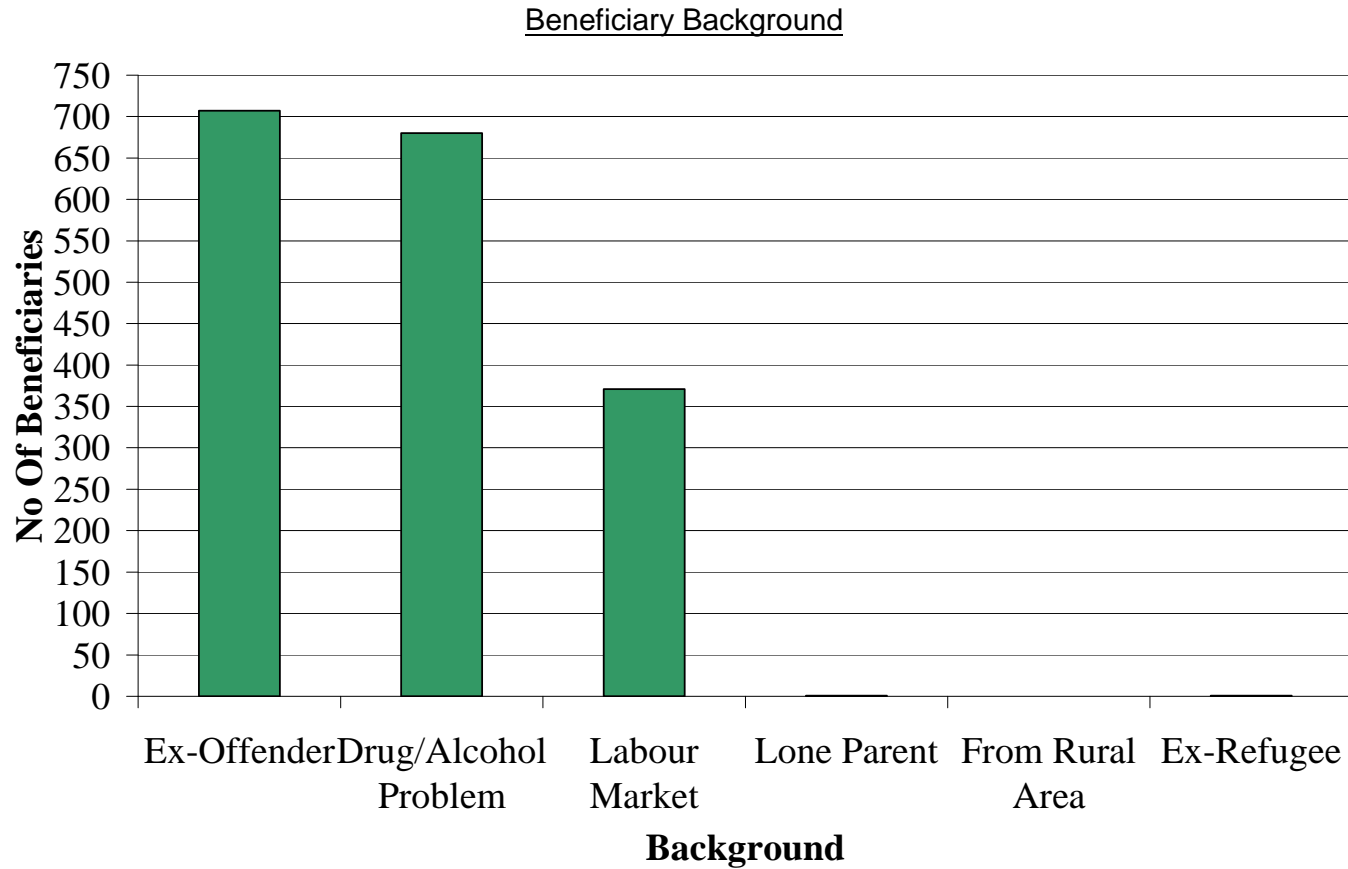
Beneficiaries Finishing in Highpoint

- 16 of the beneficiaries who started in Highpoint were classified as being disabled.
- 16 of the beneficiaries who finished in Highpoint were classified as being disabled.

Needs of the Beneficiaries Started in Highpoint



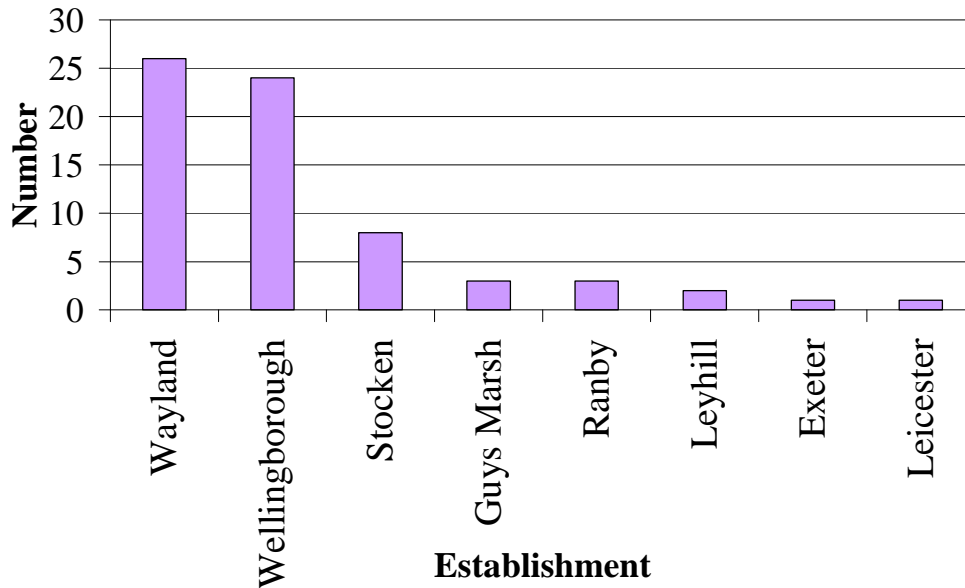
- Over 90% of the beneficiaries who started in Highpoint needed help with employment.
- Over 85% of the beneficiaries who started in Highpoint needed help with education issues.
- Over 50% of the beneficiaries who started in Highpoint needed help with housing issues.



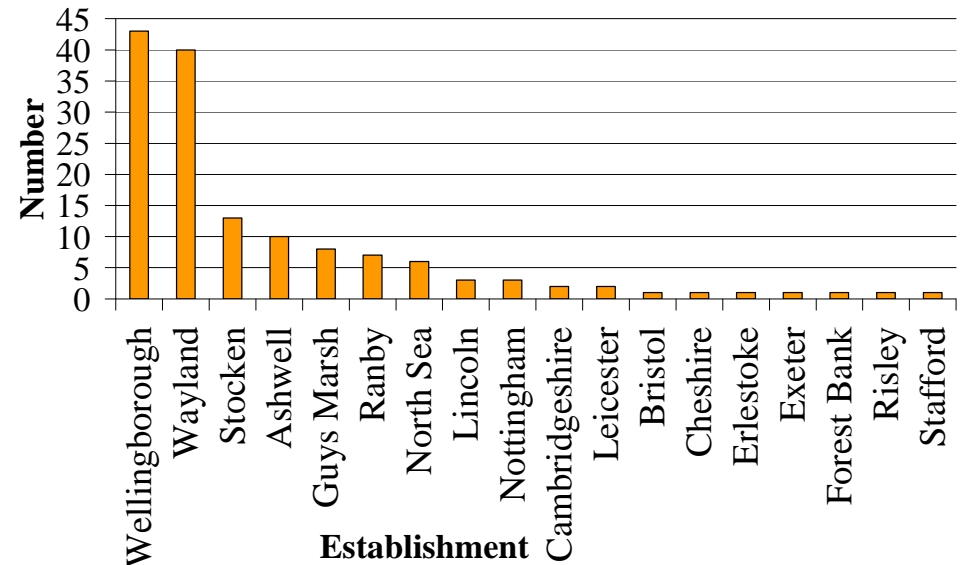
- Over 700 of the beneficiaries who started in Highpoint were ex-offenders.
- Nearly 700 of the beneficiaries who started in Highpoint had a drug or alcohol problem.

Transfers into Highpoint

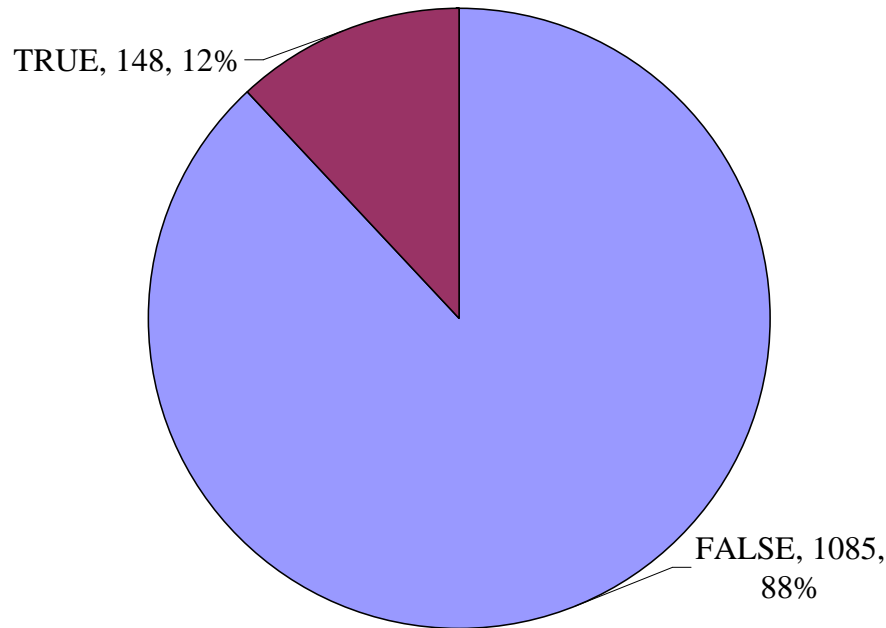


Transfers from Highpoint

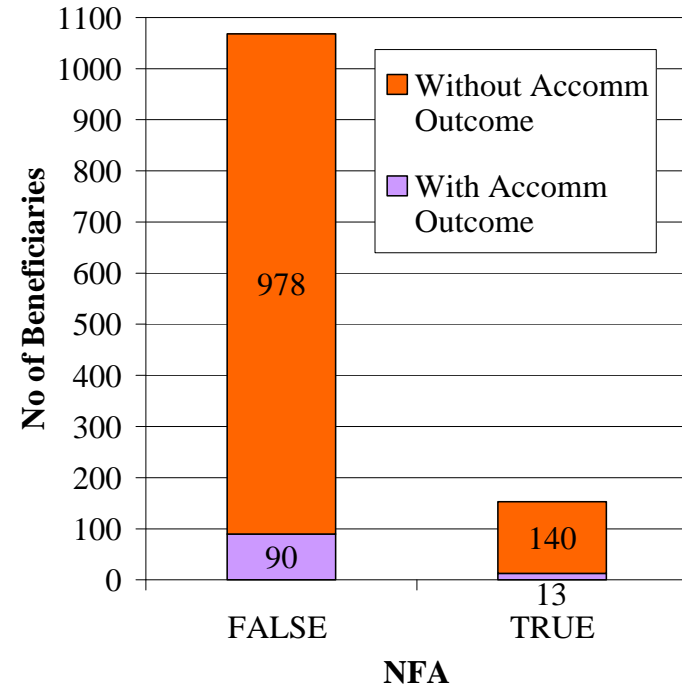


- 68 beneficiaries have transferred into Highpoint – 74% transferred to Highpoint from Wayland or Wellingborough.
- 144 beneficiaries have transferred from Highpoint – 74% transferred from Highpoint to Wellingborough, Wayland, Stocken or Ashwell.

Beneficiaries that have No Fixed Abode

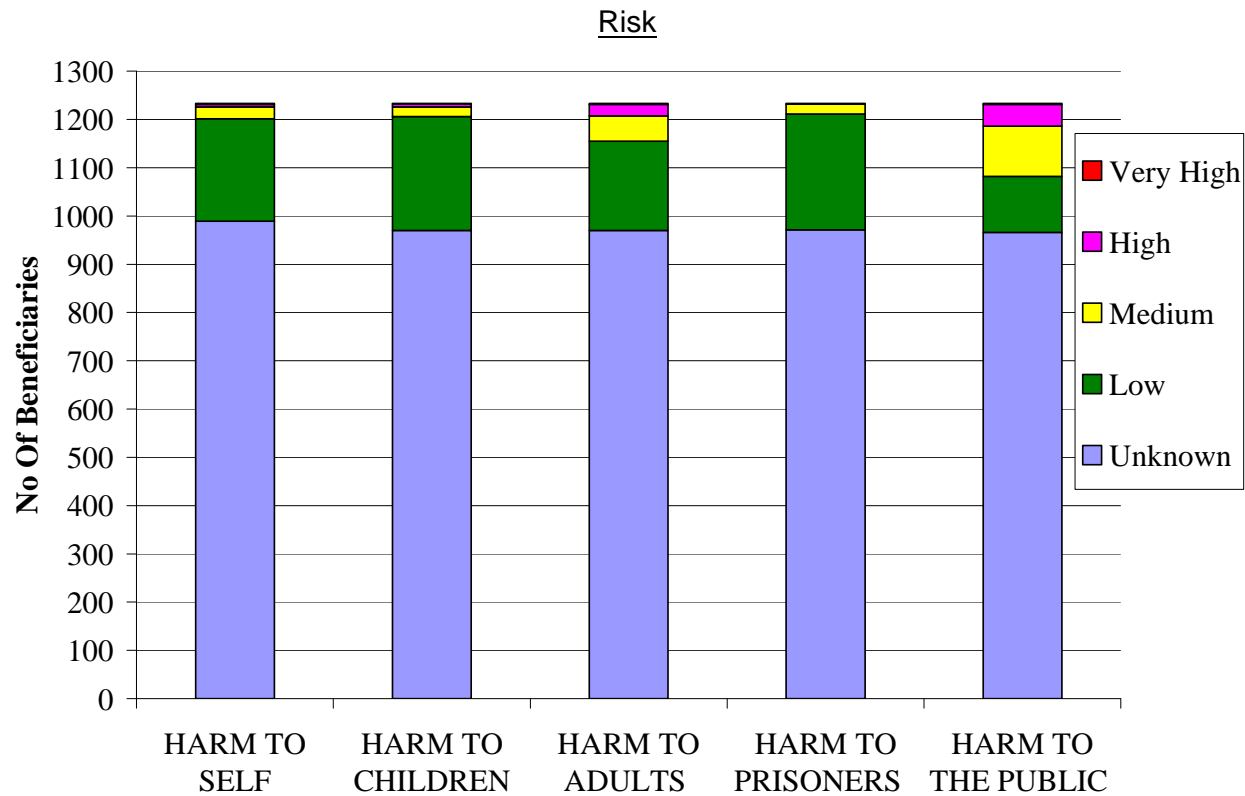


Beneficiaries Starting in Highpoint



Beneficiaries Finishing in Highpoint

- 12% (148) of the beneficiaries started in Highpoint were classed as having no fixed abode on starting the project.
- 153 beneficiaries were classed as having no fixed abode on finishing the project. Of these, 13 had an accommodation outcome secured.



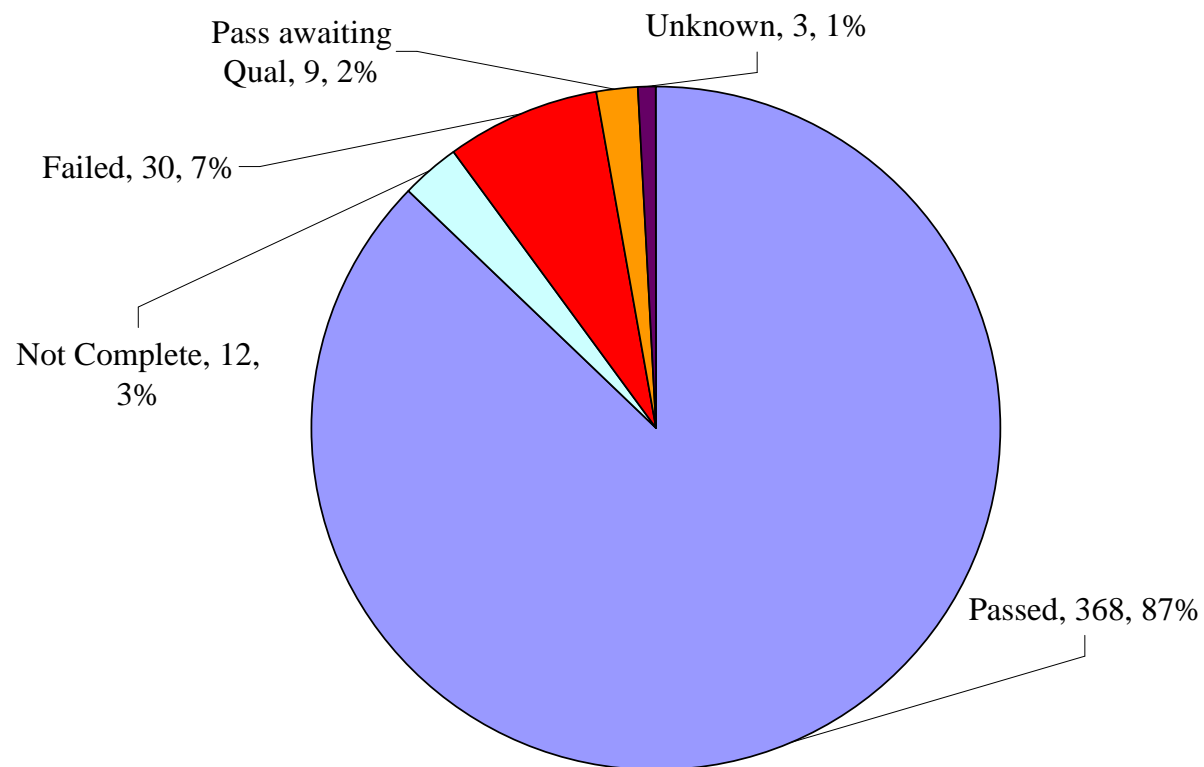
- For over 900 beneficiaries, the level of risk of harm is unknown.
- Where risk is known, the majority of the beneficiaries are low risk prisoners.

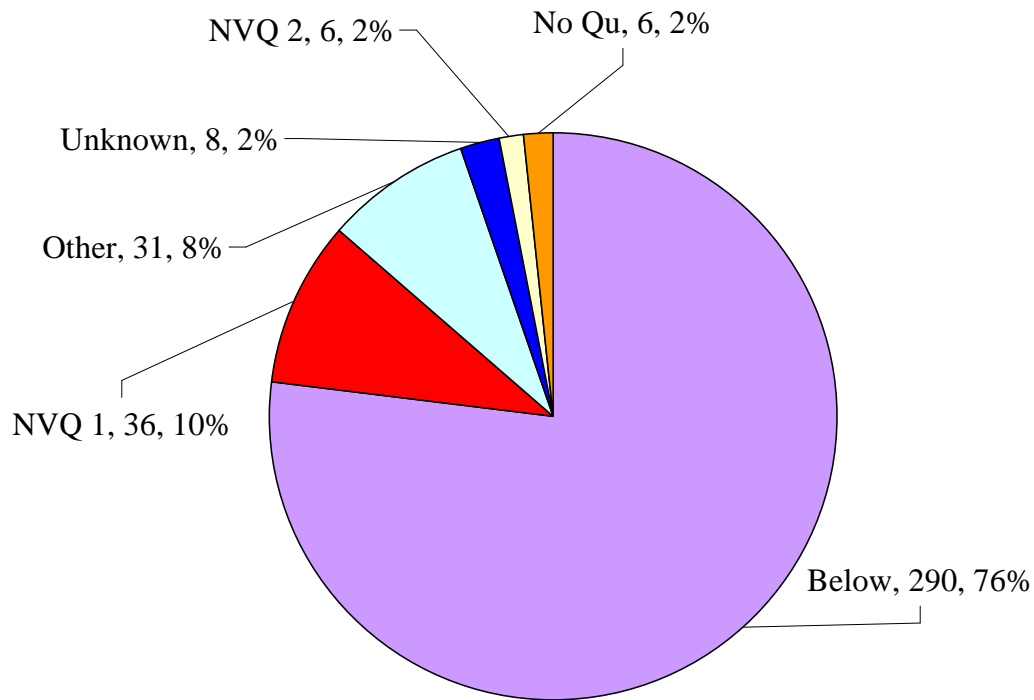
- 699 soft outcomes were gained by Highpoint beneficiaries.
- 153 beneficiaries gained assistance writing a CV.
- 151 beneficiaries obtained non-NVQ qualifications while in prison.
- Beneficiaries in Highpoint attended 132 interviews – Further Education, Fresh Start, Homeless, Job, New Deal and Progress to Work interviews.
- 2 beneficiaries utilised the Beneficiary Access Fund.

Exam Results



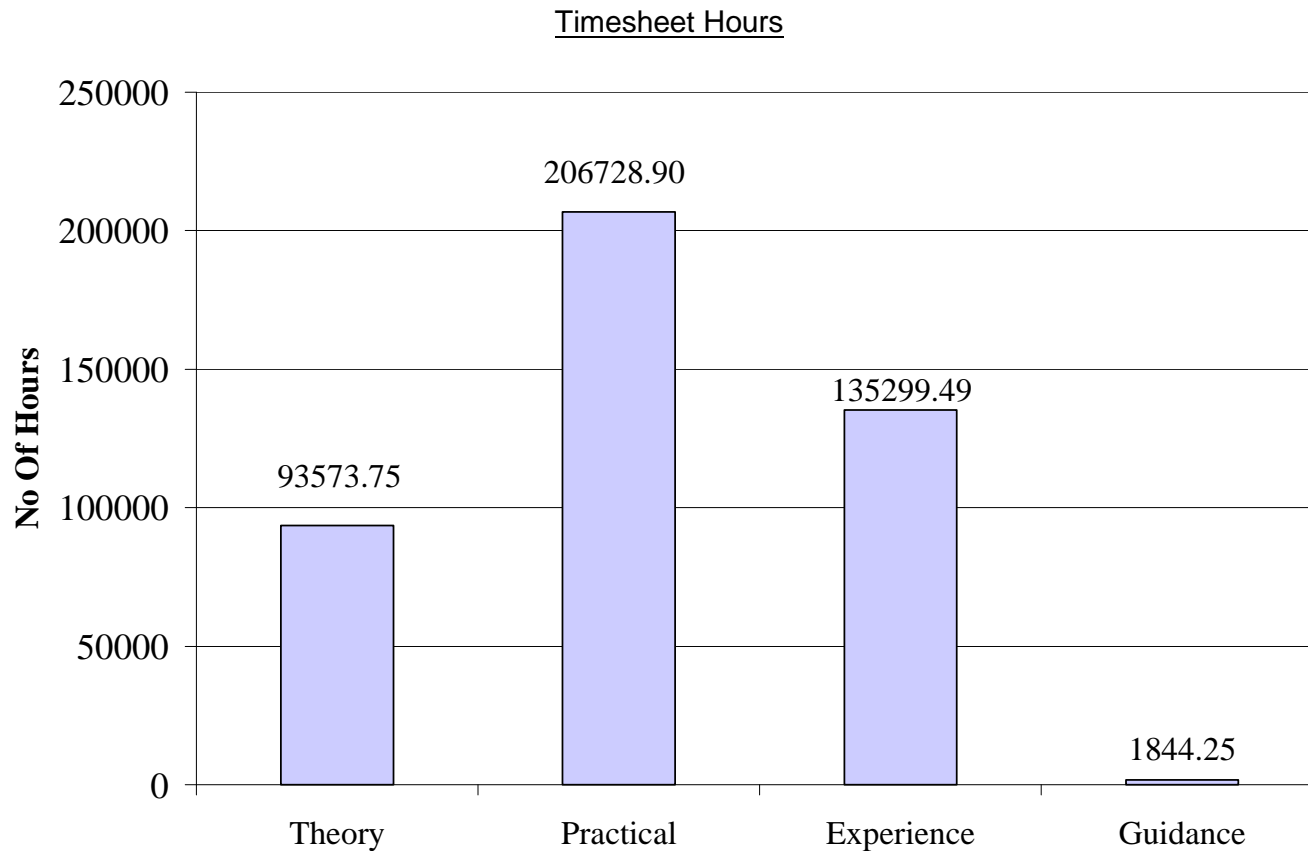
- 89% (377) of the exams taken were passed.
- Only 7% exams were failed.

NVQ Equivalence for Passed Subjects



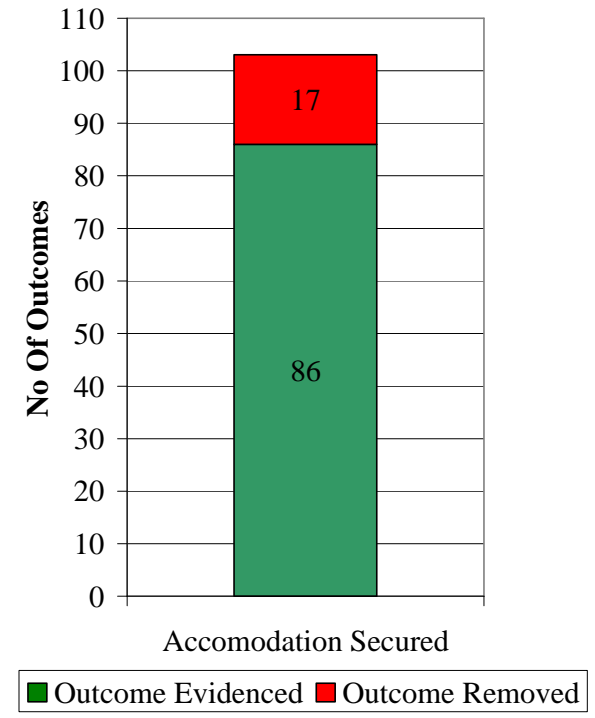
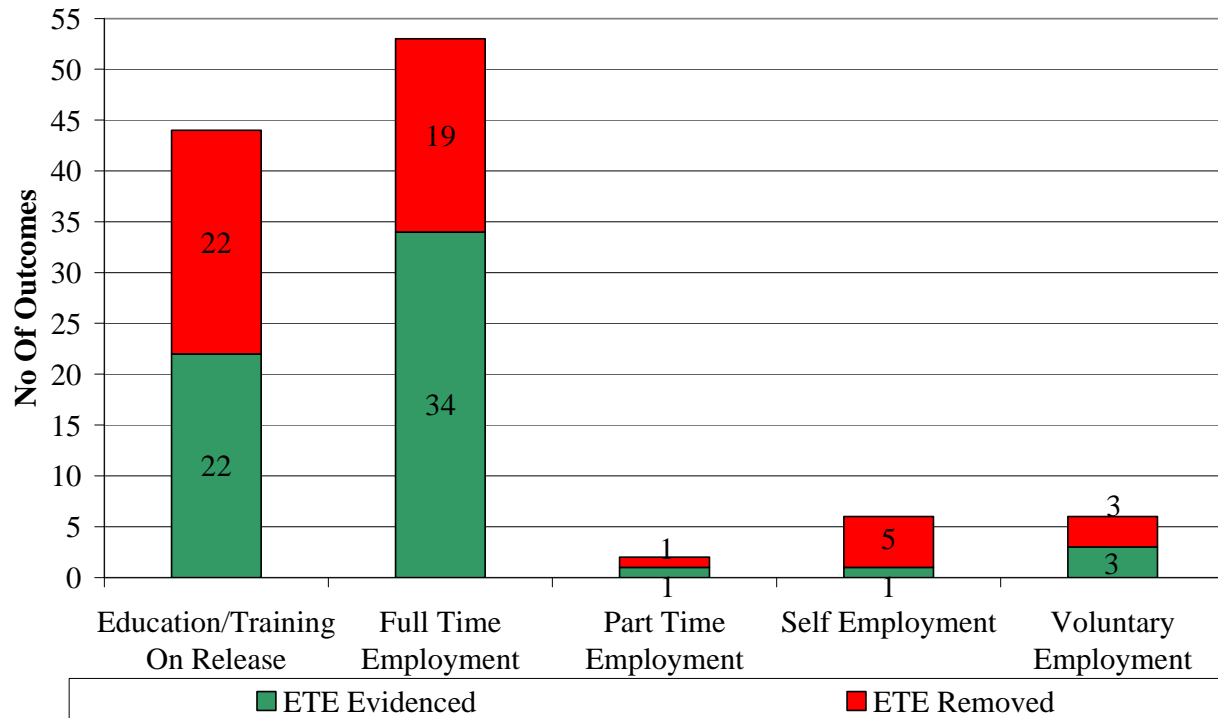

- 42 NVQ levels 1 and 2 have been gained by beneficiaries in Highpoint.
- 190 adult literacy and numeracy courses have been passed by beneficiaries in Highpoint.



- 437,446 hours were collected from PS Plus beneficiaries.
- 206,729 (47%) of the hours collected were for practical activities.

Hard Outcomes



- 111 hard education, training and employment (ETE) outcomes have been recorded at Highpoint with evidence for 61 of these outcomes (55% evidence for outcome rate).
- 103 accommodation outcomes have been recorded with evidence for 86 outcomes (83% evidence for outcome rate).
